"And for some reason, they were super easy. From then on I forced my friends and family to let me sew curtains, pillows and blinds for them."

Every design project needs a little enthusiasm. Whether you've met <u>Ambrose Price</u> of HGTV's *The Decorating Adventures of Ambrose Price* or watched him on television, his enthusiasm radiates around him. His fun personality is what attracts people to his designs.
