Laying down a few bathroom design rules



Interior design is all about taking a space, seeing its potential and figuring out what to do to bring that potential to life.

As I always say, work with the space, not against it! But every now and then, you feel like just laying down the law and sharing some of your ultimate design 'don'ts.'

For this column I decided to get honest (and humorous), and share my top design don'ts for bathroom spaces. Read on and see if you agree — or if you don't!

Don't 'mix and match'

When browsing a store or website, different plumbing fixtures can easily appear to be the exact same shade of white.

Side-by-side in your bathroom, however, the subtle differences between a mismatched tub and toilet can become a lot less subtle.

The best bet is to settle on one manufacturer to source all your major fixtures so they coordinate

This goes for your shower fixtures as well — I'm all for mixing metals elsewhere but here you should pick one collection for a consistent finish.

For the cleanest look, don't even mix-match your towels, as this can easily start to look messy (and coloured towels often fade badly).

Don't lean on one light

Anyone who has tried to get ready in the morning in a bathroom with a single potlight has probably noticed that their face looks a bit different once they go out into natural lighting — or at least the people around them notice!

Use multiple sources of light in the bathroom to avoid missing stray hairs and the like, ideally including both wall lights and ceiling lights together.

If construction isn't an option, you can usually still add a plug-in sconce or two; there are plenty of options on the market with beautiful cords that become a cool feature.

Don't display your essentials

Trendy open shelving is great for sharing personal mementos in the bedroom or stashing plates and bowls in the kitchen.

In the bath, however, basics like bathroom toilet tissue and an array of toiletries easily become overwhelming clutter.

Display a nice soap or a few perfumes, and keep as many other items hidden as possible — including the toilet brush!

A tip-out drawer in front of the sink can be a great place to quickly toss items you might be tempted to leave out, like a brush, razor, or makeup.

Also try using small glass jars inside a medicine cabinet to keep items contained but handy.

Don't hide behind a curtain

It can be tempting to "makeover" your bathroom by simply hanging a bright and bold shower curtain, but this can quickly shrink the space — plus every guest will peek behind the curtain to see what you're hiding anyway.

(Or at least I would, but I guess I'm nosey!) Use a white or pale curtain to keep the look airy, and skip the funny prints.

For the biggest makeover, don't use any curtain, upgrading to a fixed glass panel instead. If you want to add personality by hanging art, use a framed photo or painting instead.

A few more don'ts for good measure

Don't even consider carpeting in the bathroom — and this includes wrap-around rugs for the toilet. For a warm floor try a Nu-heat in-floor system, and avoid the fabric germ-traps.

Don't leave your toothbrush out on the counter, as it will inevitably pick up misted water from the sink and even

from toilet flushes — plus nobody needs to see your leftovers from the night before!

Don't get overly trendy with your long-term fixtures. A hip brass faucet will stay in style for a long time, but that pink sink? You'll probably regret it in five years.

Designer or electrician? These experts are both
